Ocean Park Trails

There are several Ocean Park trails. **Three** are open to the public year-round, and they are described below. Other trails are on Oceanwood and New England Baptist Council property and are reserved for horses.

Guild Park Trail

The Red Dot Trail is the oldest trail. It circles through the Ocean Park Association's famous Guild Park Cathedral Pines. The first half of the trail is generously wide and allows for easy walking.

From Temple Avenue go northeast on Free Street. At the junction of Free and Winona Avenue, look for the Guild Park sign. Follow the red blazes as the trail circles through pines and hemlocks until it reaches Hemlock Brook where it turns right and follows the brook back to Free Street.

The Red Dot Trail is also accessible from the Covered Bridge and from the small parking area on Temple Avenue, across from Manor Street, where there is an information kiosk.

Manor Street Trail

The Blue Dot Trail begins on Free Street, just down from Winona Ave. At the entrance is a short boardwalk. Follow the blue blazes. The trail follows Hemlock Brook on the north side and eventually comes out at the Red Dot Trail on the west side of the brook.

Crossing the brook is a boardwalk bridge which takes you back to the pine grove and the Red Dot Trail.


The Ted Wells Memorial Trail

(formerly the White Dot Trail) This woods-to-salt marsh trail offers excellent bird observation and an opportunity to see plant succession. The trail crosses property belonging to Oceanwood Camp and the Rachel Carson National Wildlife Refuge. It ends near the Goosefare Brook. A pre-existing boardwalk and platform have been permanently removed.

Take Royal Street to Camp Oceanwood. Follow the road around the dining hall and look for the swimming pool. The trail begins at the rear left of the swimming pool. Sign in at the information kiosk and take a Trail Guide. Follow the white blazes. Notify Oceanwood (207-934-9655) prior to using this trail.

In 1963 Ocean Park was designated as an official game preserve and game sanctuary. "No person shall at any time hunt, pursue, molest, trap, catch, shoot, kill or destroy any wild bird or wild animal" within the boundaries of Ocean Park. In keeping with this protection, pets should be leashed or clearly under an owner's control, and waste material should be removed.
